

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Community Midwives and...Sex?

- Physiological birth (labor that's allowed to follow the normal hormonal cascade, not disturbed or rushed)
- Psychological safety (dark, quiet, private, familiar space with no strangers)



Community Midwives and...Sex?

Sex is part of the **fertility continuum** (a universal lifespan process that connects us to our ancestors and descendants)

- preconception and conception
- pregnancy and birth
- the Babymoon and Fourth Trimester
- breastfeeding and weaning
- childhood to adulthood and building a new family



- Hormone that plays an important role in social bonding, social learning, and cardiovascular function
- ▶ Discovered in 1906
- ► The first polypeptide hormone to be synthesized (1953), leading to a Nobel Prize
- We have oxytocin receptors throughout the body, with concentrations in the uterus, testes, mammary glands, and heart



"The Love Hormone"/ "The Shy Hormone"

- Creates "warm fuzzies"
 - ► feelings of <u>calm</u>, <u>connection</u>, <u>contentment</u>, <u>closeness</u>, and <u>caring</u>
 - reduces blood pressure, inhibits cortisol, promotes healing

"The Love Hormone"/ "The Shy Hormone"

- ▶ Released from the pituitary gland during activities that involve social bonding, such as:
 - **-**cuddling
 - sexual arousal & intercourse to orgasm
 - ▶ labor & childbirth
 - breastfeeding





In a **physiological birth** where the mother feels **psychologically safe**:

- ▶Stimulates contractions
- Initiates a positive feedback loop
 - ► Harder, faster contractions
 - ► Increased pain tolerance
- ▶Stimulates FER (fetal ejection reflex)

The Golden Hour



Right after birth,
 everyone in the room is
 bathed in oxytocin:

- Mom
- Dad
- Baby
- Siblings
- Attendants

The Babymoon

- ▶ Milk ejection reflex
- Shrinks uterus back to prepregnancy size
- Protective against feelings of sadness/anxiety



The Fourth Trimester

- Social and emotional growth for baby
- Confidence for new parents
- Integration of the newborn family into the wider social network



Community midwives are oxytocin specialists





In a sexual relationship where the woman feels physically and psychologically safe:

- ▶ Able to relax and reach full arousal
- ▶ Able to communicate with her partner
 - What feels good
 - ▶ What may be uncomfortable or painful
- Greater orgasmic frequency

Oxytocin is the foundation of female sexual response.

- ▶The foundation of consent
 - ► A person is meant for relationship with others
 - ► A person only exists in a body
 - ▶ The body is an expression of the person

I'm not just **a** body. I'm **some**body.

▶ The foundation of consent

- ▶ The meaning and purpose of being human is **to love**
- Having a body means I can participate in the mystery of giving and receiving love
- ▶ It sets me free to make the **choice to love** or not to love

▶ The foundation of consent

"Freedom is given for love. It can lead to destruction and division, but it's intended to bestow life and establish unity. It's our *choice*."

▶ The foundation of consent

- "Intimate sex requires that you feel as if your spouse values you not just for what you can give them but for who you are."

Obligation sex inhibits female sexual response.

Threats to safety:

 Cultural messages/internalized beliefs about obligation sex

Threats to safety:

 Cultural messages/internalized beliefs about obligation sex

"Transaction: I did this, so you owe me.

Obligation: You owe me. Coercion: You owe me, so I'm going to take what I want."

Two types of obligation sex:

Within a relationship

Gregoire et al. (2021): study of 20,000 married evangelical women

Outside of a relationship

Armstrong et al. (2012): study of 15,000 heterosexual undergraduates



When a woman's **physical** or **psychological safety** is threatened:

- Feelings of <u>calm</u>, <u>connection</u>, <u>contentment</u>, <u>closeness</u>, and <u>caring</u> are lost
- Nervous system may engage in fight, flight, fawn, or freeze
 - ▶ Stress hormones (adrenaline, cortisol) replace oxytocin
- May feel detached or disconnected from her body and partner (mild to severe dissociation)

Outcomes of Obligation Sex:

- Female sexual pain
 - ▶ The Great Sex Rescue study: one third of respondents
 - estimated 18-28% of women worldwide
 - ▶ can be physiological or psychological in origin
- ▶ The "orgasm gap"
 - ► The Great Sex Rescue study: 95% of men almost always/always orgasm during a sexual encounter, vs. 48% of women
 - national average: 3 to 1 in favor of men



Cultural messages/internalized beliefs - within a relationship

- I have to have sex to prevent my partner's porn use
 - ▶ 19% more likely to experience sexual pain
 - ▶ 24% less likely to orgasm reliably
- I'm obligated to have sex whenever my husband wants it
 - ▶ 37% more likely to experience sexual pain
 - ▶ 29% less likely to frequently orgasm



Cultural messages/internalized beliefs - outside of a relationship

- ► Hookups are a low-risk way to enjoy sex in college
- ▶ Being drunk allows you to hook up with anyone without commitment
- ▶ It's acceptable for men to pressure women for sexual acts
- Hookups are about male pleasure
 - A woman who asks a male hookup partner to prioritize her pleasure is rude and demanding
 - A woman should feel guilty for expecting a hookup partner to give her an orgasm
 - A woman should do whatever she can to bring her male partner to orgasm during a hookup



- ▶ The hookup orgasm gap (Armstrong et al., 2012):
 - ▶ Initial hookup: man 31%, woman 10% (orgasm gap 3.1:1)
 - Repeated encounters with same partner: orgasm gap shrinks each time
 - ▶ In a relationship: man 85%, woman 68% (orgasm gap 1.25:1)


Study Participant: "I'm all about just making her orgasm."

Interviewer: "The general her or like the specific her?"

Participant: "Girlfriend her. In a hookup her, I don't give a shit."




- ▶ 85% of college women would prefer not to hook up
 - Most women want to reserve sex for an exclusive bonded relationship characterized by mutual commitment and caring (for the majority, this means marriage)
- ▶ 15% willingly and regularly hook up (this group accounts for 50% of hookup encounters)



▶ 30% opt out of hooking up


▶ 55% hook up against preference



So why do women participate in hookups?

- ▶ 55% of college women hook up because of social pressure
 - Overestimate how often their peers are hooking up
 - Afraid of losing their chance at a career if they commit to a relationship in college
 - Social activities and dorm life center around sex
 - Pressured by men into sexual acts
 - Feel compared to dating apps, social media, and porn
 - Are told they should only sleep with the guys they don't like (to avoid "catching feelings")

Catching Feelings

"Saying we can have sex without emotions is like saying we can have sex without bodies."

Armstrong et al. (2012): "relationship sex is better for women in terms of orgasm and sexual enjoyment"



- More oxytocin for her (<u>calm</u>, <u>connection</u>, <u>contentment</u>, <u>closeness</u>, and <u>caring</u>)
- More vasopressin receptors for him (modulates testosterone, enables oxytocin) - stays in the brain if he's around her but **not** having sex



- One in four college women reported being victimized in some way as a result of hookups (Online College Social Life Survey)
- ▶ 80% of campus sexual assaults occur during a hookup (Malone & Harris, *Battles of the Sexes*)
- ▶ 64% of freshman women who hook up do so under the influence of alcohol (Malone & Harris)
- ► Hooking up has a greater negative impact on college women's health, including mental health, than nutrition and exercise (Malone & Harris)



"Hookup culture...demands carelessness, rewards callousness, and punishes kindness. In this scenario, both men and women have the opportunity to have sex but neither is entirely free to love."
